Course Description

The course is a mathematically rigorous introduction to Probability theory. Among others we discuss concepts from measure and integration theory, convergence of random variables, independence, laws of large numbers, characteristic functions, the central limit theorem, conditional expectation and martingales.

Course Prerequisites

MATH 607 (Real variables I); MATH 447 (Principles of Analysis II) or equivalent; MATH 411 (Mathematical Probability) or equivalent.

Course Learning Outcomes

As a student in this course you will:

- ★ Identify and reproduce the theoretical framework underlying a probability space.
- ★ Recognize and apply basic tools of measure theory in probability.
- ★ Understand different types of convergence of sequences of random variables and limit theorems.
- ★ Be able to determine martingales and stopping times.
- ★ Be expected to understand definitions and theoretic statements as well as the proofs of crucial theorems.
- ★ Experience scientific writing with LaTeX.
- ★ Increase your oral presentation skills.



Textbook and/or Resource Materials

The course will be partially based on "Probability: theory and examples" by Richard Durrett, Duxbury Press, 4th edition, 2010. An updated version of this book is available online on <u>his website</u>. Lecture notes will become available in the Canvas course website as the course moves on (more details below). Grading Policy

The final grade will be based on the results of individual and group assignments, written work and a final presentation. Precise details will be provided at the beginning of the course, the following are guidelines.

- Grading scale: A: 100-90, B:90-80, C:80-70, D:70-60, F:60-0.
- Written work (25%): Each week a student will be responsible for typing the corresponding lecture notes in LaTeX. This may include completing proofs and/or short exercises.
- Homework (50%): A set of problems will appear at the end of each chapter to be worked out collaboratively.
- Presentation (25%): At the end of the semester, each student is expected to give a short presentation about a result of their own choice.

Graded Attendance – Attendance is expected and may affect the final grade. Excuses for absences must be substantiated by appropriate documentation. As far as possible, you should inform me and provide the pertinent documentation before a class period is missed.
